WHICH COUNCIL DOES WHAT?

Tavistock Town Council services include markets, Town Hall, play & recreation areas, allotments, burials, commercial and residential properties and responsibility for areas of the public and natural realms. West Devon Borough Council delivers social housing, environmental health, planning, economic development, (most) car parks, Council Tax, elections, revenues & benefits, street cleaning & waste collection. Devon County Council delivers education, social services, transport, highways (including on-street parking), waste disposal, libraries & trading standards.

A COUNCILLOR...WHO ME?

To be a local Councillor, you must be at least 18 and a UK, Commonwealth or EU Citizen, and live and/or work in the Parish of Tavistock. If you are unsure of your eligibility, please contact the Elections Office at West Devon Borough Council.

WHY WOULD I WANT TO BE A COUNCILLOR?

People stand for election for many reasons



•To speak on behalf of the local community and help local people

•To contribute business or professional skills to public life

•To play a role in shaping the future of their local community

Councillors play a vital role in shaping and directing local services for the benefit of local people. They work with the Police, Health and other public bodies, representatives of organisations and the private sector.

The position of Councillor is central to our local communities. Councillors act as the democratic voice of local people and ensure that local services meet local needs.

WHAT'S INVOLVED IN BEING A COUNCILLOR?

The role of a Councillor can be varied and rewarding. The main areas of responsibility are:

- •Representing the people in your area
- •Community leadership
- •Influencing the way local services are delivered •Formulating local policies
- •Attending Meetings of the full Council every 4/6 weeks. You may also choose to serve on one or more of the Council's Committees, such as Budget & Policy or the Development Management & Licensing Committees, or Consultative or Working Groups.

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

What would my time commitments be? It will depend on the extent of your involvement and what role you take on the Council.

- •The length of most Meetings is under two hours
- •You are likely to be required to deal with constituents' queries at home.

Can I afford it?

- •The Council has an allowance scheme for all elected Members which will be subject to review periodically. All Councillors receive a basic allowance, currently £722 per year (under review).
- •In addition the Mayor, by virtue of their special responsibilities, receives an additional Allowance.

Will it affect any benefits I receive?

•The situation regarding benefits can be complicated, so you are advised to seek the guidance of your local Benefits Office if in doubt.

Do I have to be a member of a political group?

•No, Councillors need not be identified with a political group, although some choose to be.

Where and when do meetings take place?

•Most formal meetings of the Council and its Committees take place in the Council Chamber, Drake Road, Tavistock. Meetings are held at various times but generally begin at 6.30pm on a Tuesday evening.

What initial help will be given?

•There will be an induction programme to help you understand the Council's services and priorities, and the aims and challenges we face. Detailed advice will be provided to newly elected Councillors about sources of information and how they can be accessed.
